TOP THINGS TO DO

- **Luther House & Melanchthon House** — The world's largest Reformation museum occupies the monastery where Luther lived for 35 years.
- **Castle Church & 95 Theses Door** — Walk to the iconic Schlosskirche where Luther is buried and the famous bronze Theses Door stands as a monument to the...
- **Asisi Reformation Panorama** — A massive 360° circular painting by artist Yadegar Asisi immerses you in Wittenberg as it looked in 1517, complete with...
- **Market Square & Stadtkirche St. Marien** — The cobblestone Marktplatz holds Luther and Melanchthon statues and the grand Rathaus.
- **Elbe River Walk & Countryside** — Wittenberg sits in the flat, green Elbe floodplain.

BEST WALKS

- **Reformation Old Town Loop** 2 km · 45–60 min · Flat cobblestones — The classic arc through Wittenberg's UNESCO core.
- **Dock to Market Square River Walk** 1.5 km · 15–20 min · Flat — A pleasant introductory walk from the pier along the Elbe bank into the historic centre — good orientation before diving into the...

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

- Wear comfortable shoes. Cobblestones throughout the old town — pretty but uneven.
- Museums close on Mondays and keep shorter hours on Sundays. Check in advance if Luther House is your priority.
- Carry some cash for public toilets (€0.50–1), small bakeries, and market stalls. Cards accepted in museums and most restaurants.
